Shipboard Emergency Medical kit



A standard First aid kit includes

- Antiseptic wipes to clean wounds
- First aid cream
- A variety of adhesive bandages
- Gauze pads
- Adhesive tape
- Sting relief wipes
- Cold packs
- Scissors
- Aspirin









Antiseptic wipes to clean wounds



Antiseptic Wipes have a wide variety of uses. The short answer is, they are used for sterilizing. Antiseptic wipes kill germs and sanitize skin or whatever surface to which they are applied. Antiseptic wipes can be used to clean wounds, help perform a sterile catheter procedure, and prepare skin for surgery. They are a mainstay of home first aid kits and hospitals. It is always important to consult a medical professional, preferably your personal doctor or nurse, if you have any questions about your specific wound or wound care.









First aid cream



This antiseptic cream soothes and heals wounds, protects against infection and can be used to treat cuts and grazes, minor burns and scalds, small areas of sunburn, dry chapped skin, nappy rash, insect bites, spots and pimples.









Adhesive bandages



Adhesive bandages are available in a range of sizes making them suitable for covering all sizes of cuts or grazes. These dressings allow a wound to breathe and heal whilst providing protection from infection. Adhesive dressings are a fantastic addition to any first aid kit.











Gauze pads



Gauze is a type of thin medical fabric with a loose open weave used in wound care. They wick vertically to draw exudates out of wounds and are stronger than other types of dressings due to their longer fibres.













Adhesive tape



Adhesive tapes are used to hold dressings in place or to hold the loose end of bandages. Also good when necessary to tape fingers and or toes together.











Sting relief wipes



The sting relief wipes temporarily relieve pain and itching associated with minor burns, scrapes, insect bites and stings.

The wipes easily cleanse the area around point of insect puncture. Individual single use packets are easy and convenient to use. Perfect as a first aid refill or standalone.













Cold packs



Cooling an injury like a sprain or bruise can help to reduce the swelling and pain. There are two types of compress: ice packs, and cold pads, which can be made from dampening a cloth with cold water.













Scissors



Scissors, shears and tweezers are used to cut sterile pads, bandages or sticky tape to the right length.

They need to be strong enough to cut through clothing if you need to get to a wound.











Aspirin



It does a good job of relieving pain and bringing down fevers. It has also been shown to reduce the risk of heart attack, stroke, and colon cancer. It can even stop heart attacks and strokes in their tracks.
